Our classroom featured a lot of dramatic play in January. With themes of both transportation and winter, our housekeeping area reflected authentic child-initiated learning at its best. The children helped us brainstorm ideas as to which mode of transportation they wanted to create in the back corner of our room, and majority vote ruled that it would be an airplane. We then generated a list of things that their airplane would need. It was amazing to learn that many of the children are already experienced air travelers! They told us we needed seats, windows, seatbelts, cockpit, luggage and, most importantly, snacks, drinks and trays to serve with. We went straight to work and, voila, an airplane was created! The children had fun taking turns being pilots, passengers and cabin attendants.

As we began our theme on winter, the buzz in the classroom was definitely focused on the movie *Frozen*. Taking the lead from the students again, we decided to turn housekeeping into an ice castle. After they covered the walls with "ice" (aka, foil wrap) and snowflakes, the children decided they needed several essential ice castle items like icicles, ice steps, a fancy chandelier and, of course, a magical door that opens by itself. The children loved their creation and surely talked about it at home. Thank you for coming in (we know at their urging) to check out their masterpiece.

The last couple weeks of January also presented us with a social experiment of sorts. As our ice castle was built, we noticed that only the girls were playing in it, as they were pretending to be gueens and princesses. So, we sat the children down and had a discussion about whether it was okay if boys played in the castle and could girls play in blocks? With a bit of encouragement from teachers, the children agreed that it would indeed be okay. Behold! Later that day we saw the boys slowly migrate to the castle and the girls went to blocks! What's all the fuss about gender stereotypes? BUT, after watching the children play closely for a few days, we found that the boys were using the magic wands in the ice castle as swords and the girls were playing with cars and blocks as the "baby toys" as they played house! Did you know? - Some fun facts about groundhogs!

- The average groundhog is 20" long and weighs from 12-15 lbs. (Punxsutawney Phil weights about 20 lbs. and is 22" long.)
- Groundhogs are covered with coarse grayish hairs (fur) tipped with brown or sometimes dull red. They have short ears, a short tail, short legs, and are surprisingly quick. Their jaws are exceptionally strong.
- A groundhog's diet consists of lots of greens, fruits, and vegetables, but very little water. Most of their liquid comes from dew on leaves.
- A groundhog can whistle when it is alarmed. Groundhogs whistle in the spring when they begin courting.
- Insects do not bother groundhogs and germs pretty much leave them alone. They are resistant to the plagues that periodically wipe out large numbers of wild animals. One reason for this is their cleanliness.
- Groundhogs are one of the few animals that really hibernate. Hibernation is not just a deep sleep. It is actually a deep coma where the body temperature drops to a few degrees above freezing, the heart barely beats, the blood scarcely flows, and the breathing nearly stops.
- Young groundhogs are usually born in mid-April or May, and by July they are able to go out on their own. The size of the litter is four to nine. A baby groundhog is called a kit or a cub.
- A groundhog's life span is normally 6-8 yrs. "Phil" receives a drink of a magical punch every summer during the annual Groundhog Picnic, which is said to give him seven more years of life!
